

From the Minister ...

There are some years I struggle to know what to write in my Christmas message to you all. After all, the story remains the same, the characters are a constant, the message of love



come down amongst us at the heart of all we strive to do as a church and how we try to relate to one another... You'll have reflected countless times as I have on the unconventional birth of our saviour in a dirty, unhygienic, cold stable. This is a place in which nobody would expect to be meeting with the King of kings... and yet... it was here amongst the chaos and confusion that the shepherds (also highly unlikely candidates to be the first to greet him...) met the newborn Jesus shortly followed by the scholars from the east.

Recently I have spent a lot of time thinking through how and where each one of us encounters Jesus in our lives today. For some of us this will be in the stillness of a traditional church service in which we are surrounded by familiarity – hymns, liturgy, stillness. For others, we might encounter God most strongly in the beauty of creation – those mountaintop moments of awe and beauty. Some might meet with God in their interactions with others. I remember being a young person attending big, loud events as a member of what was in those days FURY (Fellowship of United Reformed Youth) and finding my faith strengthened by those contemporaries who also called themselves Christians. Growing up in a church in which I was one of the only young people was tricky and those moments enabled me to realise I wasn't walking my faith journey alone, there were others, and this helped me to find myself in the church family to which I belonged.

One of the strengths of this church family is that it is a very welcoming and warm place and good at engaging with those who might not be known to us. It is, what has often been described as a 'family church'. As with any family, there are things we disagree on – the style of music, how the church should be decorated, what constitutes as appropriate worship... When we put these things to one side though, we come to the heart of what is important, that love came down and dwelt among us showing us how to live our lives mirroring God. We all have family members we click with more than others, but that doesn't stop us being a family, similarly, we won't all agree on how we like to worship. What is important though, is that we keep giving all of those in our community, regardless of age, gender or anything else, opportunities to encounter God in a variety of styles and traditions.

Following several conversations over the last month or so I am committed to continuing to offer a variety of worship styles on a Sunday morning. We will be continuing with our traditional offering as there is huge value and importance to the familiarity. We will also be looking at different ways of worshiping together as a family, our children and young people are an important part of this family and as we gather around our Christmas meal with family members from all generations this season, it is important to gather around worship in such a way.

This Christmas, let us remember that familiar story of Christ's coming amongst us and maybe take a moment to reflect on how and where it is we have encountered the love of Jesus throughout our lives. I'm sure, it won't always have been in the times and ways we might have expected and maybe, our intergenerational times of worship as well as our more traditional offerings

can speak to you and inspire you in your own journey in 2025.

I wish you all a very happy and joyful Christmas and New Year.

Christmas Geese

The story is told of a farmer who didn't believe in Jesus. One snowy Christmas Eve, his wife was taking their children to a service at their local church. He refused to come saying: *'Why would God lower Himself to come to Earth as a man? That's ridiculous!'* So, they left him at home.

During the evening the winds grew stronger, and the snow turned to a blizzard. He heard a series of loud thumps on the window. In the field near his house he saw a flock of wild geese. Message from our Church and Community Worker...

In early November I joined 34 other Children's workers in Oxford for a two day conference, with talks, workshops, and worship led by Jenny Mills- Ministry, Sam Richards-head of Children and Youth work for the URC, 2 synod children's



support workers (Ruth White and Judy Harris) and Lorraine Webb URC Children's URC programme office. And Yvonne Morris joined us on Sunday from the diocese of Oxford.



The program had workshops on Storytelling, Intergeneration Ministry, Children Participation, Seasons of the Christian Calendar, Lego Church, plus Worship and Family Film night experience, to name a few. The core thing that came out of it from all Churches' Children's worker was we have a small number of children/families in church on Sundays.

I don't have the answer, but I do know we are well on the way. Let us remember Jesus as a refugee, a stranger in a foreign land, Lord, help us show your love to all wherever they are from, whatever they do, whatever the age. Help us to shine in the darkness.

That coin in your Christmas pudding

There is a tradition, which dates from the Middle Ages, of putting silver coins into Christmas puddings. The first coins used were a silver

farthing or penny. After World War One, it became a threepenny bit and then a sixpence. Finding one was supposed to bring you good fortune, but probably it was more likely to break a tooth as you bit into the pudding.

We now pay for most things with plastic or by tapping a mobile telephone. In future, will people put old credit cards or phones in their Christmas pudding? Hope not.

Other coins 'appear' at this time of year. Chocolate coins are traditionally given to children at Christmas time, and in Jewish tradition during Hanukkah. UKRAINE MISSION UPDATE

As we approach the end of 2024, it is a good time to summarise what Ukraine

Christian Partnership (UCP) has been supporting this year:

- Through Pastor Sergey's church in Chornobaivka, Kherson, 125 needy villagers are provided with weekly top-up food parcels and essential medical supplies.
- Funding of Pastor Sergey's house rebuilding project, helping to make war-damaged homes of elderly or needy villagers liveable once more. For homes damaged beyond repair, pre-fabricated temporary houses, 'prefabs', funded by another charity are supplied. UCP provides funding for ground preparation work, clearing away rubble and making the bases/foundations for the prefabs. UCP has been funding this project since it started in Sep 2023. Three apartment blocks and 53 houses were made liveable once more, foundations for 35 prefabricated houses were completed, and emergency repairs were made to a further 20 houses which had been recently hit by missiles or shells.
- In the spring we provided 350 village families in Transcarpathia with vegetable seeds to enable them to grow more of their own food.
- Medical grants for three villagers in Transcarpathia who needed surgery and/or treatment which they could not afford, as well as

- incontinence pads for housebound elderly patients and medical equipment for the local doctor and medical centre.
- Support to help buy a minibus for Pastor Sergey's church (and fund repairs of the Gyula church minibus).
- Funding for four summer Bible camps for children in Transcarpathia.

Thank you for your continued generosity to UCP and a special thanks to Connie's Handicraft Group for a further £100. We would be unable to do all this work without you.



DEC Middle East Humanitarian Appeal

Over the past year, war in the Middle East has devastated millions of people's lives across the region, destroying their families, homes, schools, hospitals and businesses.

This Christmas, millions of people across Gaza, Lebanon and the wider region are in urgent need of food, shelter and medical care.

The DEC brings together 15 leading UK aid charities to raise funds quickly and efficiently at times of humanitarian crisis overseas. How Tearfund is responding

Tearfund is currently working with local churches and its partners across the Middle East.

It reports:

"In Gaza, our International Health Partners are providing life-saving medicine and desperately needed healthcare.

"In Lebanon, we are working through local churches to provide food, mattresses and other essentials to people forced from their homes by the fighting.

"In the West Bank, we are working with the Diocese of Jerusalem, who are providing healthcare and education to those affected."

Elsewhere, hundreds of thousands of asylum seekers and would-be immigrants are on the road, seeking refuge anywhere they can find it.

Meanwhile, in recent years vast numbers of Christians have been forced to flee from their ancient homelands in Syria and Iraq. They mirror the Holy Family's escape into Egypt. Every time yet another infant dies violently, it is a reminder of the first century massacre of babies in the Bethlehem region.


So perhaps this year, one carol will be sung with particular poignancy. It retells the message of angels, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom His favour rests" and continues:

> Yet with the woes of sin and strife, The world has suffered long; Beneath the angel strain have rolled, Two thousand years of wrong; And man, at war with man, hears not The love song which they bring: O hush the noise, you men of strife, And hear the angels sing.

The angels' goodwill message will persist despite our clamour, for it proclaims God's all-embracing and eternal welcome. Whatever is happening on earth, Heaven's doors are ever open: it is home for everyone. The final biblical vision is of an all-encompassing city: "On no day will its gates ever be shut... the glory and honour of the nations will be brought into it."

Jesus, for whom there had been no room at the inn, taught that God's kingdom is home for every race: "I say to you that many will come from the East and the West, and will take their places at the feast with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven." He reassured those anxious about the future: "Do not let your hearts be troubled. You believe in God; believe also in me. My Father's house has many rooms..."






Christmas shopping
