- **Community development** - partnering with local churches and organisations, mobilising resources and empowering communities to lift themselves out of poverty.
- **Advocacy and influencing** - helping individuals and churches speak out on issues of poverty and injustice, and we challenge unjust policies and practices at a local, national and global level.

On Saturday 16th November, we will be coming together virtually with both churches I serve (Petersfield and Liss and London Street, Basingstoke) for a really fun 'Big Quiz' event. Tearfund run this each year, and the aim is to bring as many churches as possible together across the country to do the same quiz at the same time. Now obviously, there is a bit of a distance between Petersfield and Basingstoke and so the proposal is to use the wonders of modern technology and run this virtually this year. We will start at 7pm and a zoom link will be sent out in advance. I would like to encourage you to compete with your family, spouse or to invite friends around and form a team (maybe even sharing a nice bottle of something...) and we hope to raise a good amount to support the hugely valuable work of Tearfund globally whilst having a lot of fun together. There will be prizes for the first placed team at both churches!

God has blessed us so richly when we consider what we do have and so let's use the coming months to consider those who are less fortunate and let's make the 'Big Quiz' 2024 the biggest yet!

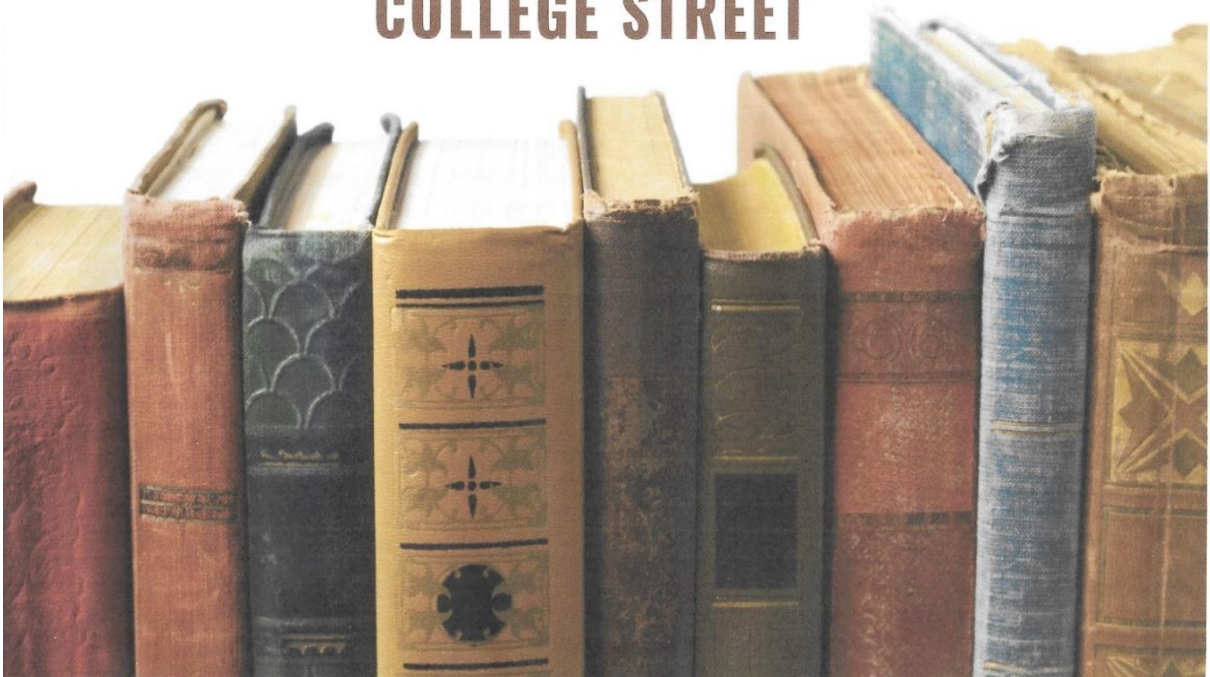

Learn to 'wait well' for things

'My future is in Your hands...'

In her helpful book, *When, God, When?* Joyce Meyer writes: "God has taught me to keep living the life I now have, while I am waiting for the things that are in my heart to come to pass. We can become so intent on trying to birth the next things that we neither enjoy nor take care of the things at hand. I had a vision from God ten years before I began to see it fulfilled. During those years, I believe I missed a lot of joy trying to give it birth outside of God's timing."

Learn to enjoy where you are, while you're waiting to get to where you want to be. After all, all your life you will spend more time waiting than you will receiving. And when you receive what you're waiting for now – you'll begin waiting for something else. That's life! If we don't learn to 'wait well', we'll live with endless frustration.

Waiting well is what will deliver our dream. Listen: "in due season we shall reap, if we faint not" (Gal. 6:9). "Due season" is when God knows we're ready, not when we think we are. He has set appointments to accomplish certain things in our life, so we might as well settle down and wait patiently, because that's when it will happen – and not before.

God knows what you need, He knows when you need it and He knows how to get it to you. All He asks you to do is trust Him.

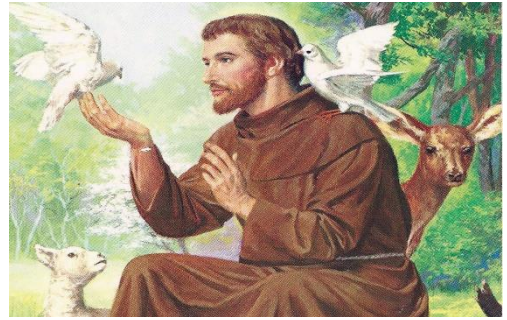
Thank you that whatever comes, we are secure in You, when we put our trust in Jesus.

St Francis and the Life of Simplicity

Just about the only thing most people know about Francis of Assisi is that he talked to the birds. Churchgoers also know the popular hymn based on his famous prayer, 'Make me a channel of your Peace', which was sung at the funeral of Princess Diana.



However, Italy's patron saint, whose feast day is this month (the 4th) was a more complex, and some would say controversial character. His life spanned the end of the 12th and beginning of the 13th centuries. He was born into a very wealthy family, but after what he called his 'conversion' standing before a crucifix. He renounced all his possessions. In fact, he stripped himself of his of his wealthy garments in a public square in his hometown, Assisi. For the rest of his life he and his followers, including his feminine counterpart. St Claire longed, prayed and worked for a life of simplicity – a lifestyle without luxury or privileges. For the Franciscan brothers and the Poor Claires this meant no private possessions at all. Francis saw that many poor people without these things, actually seemed to live happier and more fulfilling lives than the ambitious rich. He spoke of a simple life not shaped by money or power but by love and mutual concern. As his hymn says, 'it is in giving of ourselves that we receive'.

Of course, poverty; in our modern western world is seldom a matter of blissful simplicity, as present-day Franciscans recognise. For too many it is a matter of poor diet, over-crowded rooms, rough sleeping and unemployment. The call of today's followers of Francis and Claire is that those who are better-off should 'live more simply, so that others can simply live'.

Christians follow a Master who said that He came with 'good news for the poor'. They believe that many of us today can be that good news.

Eco corner - information

Plastic bag recycling available at some supermarkets including Waitrose and Tesco's Petersfield.

Soft plastic packaging can be returned to the Causeway Tesco store, the majority of which can then be recycled (80% in a trial), e.g. fruit and veg packaging, salad bags, crisp packets.

Tetrapak Cartons and paper containers (such as Pringles tubes etc.) can be recycled at the bank site at Tesco Petersfield, The Causeway, GU31 4JR

See the adjacent **Petersfield infant school recycling poster**, but if it is more convenient to you, there is a crate in the church vestibule for these items which David Barton then kindly takes to the school.

Liss junior school, if you live in Liss or are passing you might like to know that 9am -3pm during term time, Monday to Friday, reception will accept the items below. You can also now leave these items in the bag for **Liss junior school** in the church vestibule, to be kindly taken to the school by Tony Phillips who lives near the school.

Liss JS:- Digestive and other biscuit wrappers; cracker and cake wrappers; crisp packets; oral care products – toothpaste tubes and toothbrushes; Pringle tubes, **all clean and tied in a bag.**
